What is Restorative Justice?

Restorative Justice is a transformative tool that empowers everyone affected by crime to communicate and move forwards.

Restorative Justice gives people who have been harmed the chance to talk about the impact of the incident and seek answers about why it happened in a face-to-face meeting, via video, or through letters.

Victims of crime often feel excluded, confused, and revictimized by the criminal justice process. Restorative Justice brings them back to the heart of the discussion and allows them to have their voices heard – to detail the impact

the crime had on them, and to seek answers to questions they have.



It also helps the person responsible for the harm to understand the impact of their actions, and can encourage them to change their behaviour.


<u>The process of Restorative Justice (https://why-me.org/the-restorative-justice-process/)</u>

A Restorative Justice meeting only goes ahead with both parties' consent, and is mediated by a trained Restorative Justice facilitator. The facilitator has an important role in the process, speaking to both parties a number of times in advance, and helping them to understand what they hope to get out of the process. The facilitator also manages any risks, and a meeting is only arranged if they

agree that it is safe to do so.

Some people find that an initial restorative conversation with a facilitator is all that they require, and they don't need to pursue direct or indirect communication with the person who harmed them. Restorative Justice is flexible around the needs of the person who was harmed, which makes it a unique and powerful intervention in the Criminal Justice System.




